7ips From The Tackroom

Well, we are supposed to have at least a few inches of snow on the ground in mid February, but we seem to have been spared a terrible winter and jumped right into everyone's favorite time of year: MUD SEASON. Ah yes, regular rain storms, nights that dip slightly below freezing and daily surface thaws lead to the creation of your horse's favorite thing: MUD. Wildly fluctuating temperatures, slime encrusted fuzz bombs, pulled shoes, destroyed paddocks and trashed blankets are just a few the joys of the season.

This round of Tips From the Tackroom are a few helpful ideas to survive this seemingly endless stretch of mud months until fly season kicks in!

Water intake at this time of year is crucial. Heavy coats and heavy blankets can quickly lead to a colic if the temperature spikes on a sunny afternoon. Conversely, sometimes horses won't drink outside if they are too cold and the water provided is just above freezing. If you don't have freeze free tubs outside, try heating water in the heavy black rubber buckets and setting them into the larger plastic water tubs. This will last for a few hours in subfreezing temperatures. Older horses will appreciate the warmth for their sensitive teeth. Be sure to top up if more than 3 hours.

If possible, have warm water in their inside water buckets. It is quite astounding to see a horse come in from winter turnout and drink a half a bucket just because it is warm. Don't forget to top up!

Add warm water to just about anything you feed. They will slobber all over the place, but that's okay. Try adding a few spoonfuls of well soaked molasses-free beet pulp to meals. Older horses might love a side dish of really warm, well soaked hay cubes.

Blankets take on a rather gross hue of brown about this time of year. Keep an eye on temperatures and blanket or sheet (or go naked!) accordingly. Yes, a naked horse will quickly be a mud encrusted one, but he will be happy. Let it dry and curry it off. Always hang blankets inside out in the sun. They need to dry out and air. Fill an old fly spray bottle with some water and alcohol, spritz the exposed inside of the blanket and let it cook in the sun. This will help kill bacteria until your annual spring blanket washing. Try screwing some big hooks into the beams in your loft or storage areas to hang blankets that are not in use or need to dry after a particularly rambunctious mud event.

About this time of year we all ask ourselves, reclip or wait to shed out? Your call, but remember these crazy temperatures will have a shaggy horse very sweaty in no time.


Feet can be a huge problem in mud season. Try to avoid adding more moisture to the problem. If you have snow pads on your horse, be sure to squirt thrush medication under there at least once every 10 days. This is very important. Get in to the crevice behind the frog and really let it soak into the oakum. You will be very happy you did when those pads come off in a few weeks!

Finally, it is very easy to neglect tack at this time of year. A neat little suggestion is to fill an old fly spray bottle with 1/3 Murphy's Liquid Soap and the rest water. Spray it on to your tack and give it a quick rub all over.

Hopefully, you and your fuzz monster will make it thru to spring!

Prize Money of Over \$240,000 to be Awarded at Great American/USDF Regional Dressage Championships

Lexington, KY (February 1, 2019) - The United States Dressage Federation (USDF) and Great American Insurance Group are pleased to announce that prize money totaling over \$240,000 will be awarded at the 2019 Great American Insurance Group/USDF Regional Championships. This prize money will be divided evenly among the nine regions and 35 divisions that are offered, allowing each region to present competitors with over

\$27,500 in prize money and awards. Champions in each region and division will receive \$473 in prize money, an engraved silver tray, and an embroidered jacket and gift certificate provided by SmartPak, official supplement feeding system of USDF. Reserve champions in each region and division will receive \$315 in prize money, along with a saddle pad provided by the Great American Insurance Group, title sponsor of the championships.





2019 US Dressage Tests

Introductory - Fourth Level

Test Booklets now available at the USDF Online Store

Lexington, KY – US Equestrian (USEF) announced today that the co-branded 2019 USEF/United States Dressage Federation (USDF) Dressage Tests are now available and published online through USDF.

Effective December 1, 2018, through November 30, 2022, the 2019 USEF/USDF Dressage Tests are newly co-branded with the USDF as the two organizations work together to continue to proliferate and promote the sport of dressage in the United States. The 2019 USEF/USDF Dressage Tests continue to serve as a measure of the horse and rider's schooling and training, while each level builds upon the preceding level's principles.

USDF's "On the Levels" will continue to provide examples of the new Introductory through Fourth Level dressage tests. "On the Levels" features engaging videos to help athletes understand the requirements for tests within each level, with commentary from top U.S. trainers and judges and segments geared toward improving difficult movements at each level. Keep an eye out for the launch of this product in the coming months.

Additional test products will include a new test app containing both the USEF and USDF tests and, once produced, a test booklet, which can be purchased through the USDF online store at store.usdf.org.

That is all for now. Stay Warm...give hugs and kisses to our equine friends!


